


RESPONSE: Psalm 122

LITURGICAL SEASON BACKGROUND

We often describe Advent as a time of waiting. But it is a special kind of waiting; it is waiting with hearts full of hope — waiting in joyful anticipation. Advent is not the kind of waiting we do, for example, in the doctor's office, or at a red light, or at a bus stop. Such waiting is often characterized as a time when we have "nothing" to do. When we wait, however, with hearts full of hope, as we do during Advent, we have plenty to do. We spend our time preparing for what is to come, making things ready for the Promised One. Although we know the outcome, we know who is to come, we are still filled with joy over the prospect of what Jesus will do in our lives. So we quiet ourselves and our lives, and look for ways to welcome the Redeemer, who promises to make all things new again.

SCRIPTURE BACKGROUND

God assures us in today's readings that we will always have God's unfailing care. The prophet *Isaiah* speaks of how the world will be when everyone follows God's ways. We today have the same choice as the people of *Isaiah's* time: we can make the world better by following God's way. The choice is ours. However, the Gospel reminds us that the decision about how we find the presence of Jesus in our lives is God's alone. God asks us simply to be ready. Our God is the God of surprises. We are better off not knowing what to anticipate, because our imaginations are limited. God's love is unlimited. We simply need to be ready at all times, so that when Jesus comes, he can transform our lives, and carry us to places beyond our fondest dreams.

LITURGICAL ENVIRONMENT

The mood for Advent is quiet, simple, and hushed. Basic symbols include an Advent wreath, lectionary, incense, and perhaps small pine trees or pine branches. You might start especially simply and add weekly to the decor, to add to the sense of unfolding through the sea-

Consider ways to join the Advent symbols and decor with those of the Christmas season. For example, you might use small, undecorated pine trees in Advent, then light them simply for Christmas time. Or bunches of pine branches that are tied with purple or blue ribbon during Advent could then be re-do ne with gold or red ribbon for Christmas time.

1st Sunday of Advent • Year A

Some parishes use blue as an Advent color rather than purple (the rubrics do permit a "violet" shade of blue during this time); it would be best if those planning the Liturgy of the Word for children were to follow the parish custom in this.

You might display the SUNDAY Scripture Poster on an easel to help the children enter into the biblical experience. The poster could be sent home with a different family each week to color for the next celebration. When reflecting on the Gospel, you can refer to the poster; it shows Isaiah's vision of the house of God. The book of God's word, displayed facing the assembly, is the focal point of the gathering space.

CENTERING / PROCESSIONAL SONG

You might use the same centering / gathering song for the entire Advent season. Suggestions:

- "Prepare the Way of the Lord" (Berthier, Vol. 1 Sing God a Simple Song, #1, Treehaus Communications).
- "A Voice Cries Out" (Vol. 2 Sing God a Simple Song, #2, Treehaus Communications).
- "Soon and Very Soon" (Crouch, Vol. 1 Sing God a Simple Song, #2, Treehaus Communications).
- "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" (Vol. 2 Sing God a Simple Song, #1, Treehaus Communications).

If this song has been used earlier for the gathering of the larger assembly, children may be able to sing an entire stanza from memory. The children can also be taught to join in on the refrain.

You may wish to follow the gestures suggested in Sing God a Simple Song.

FIRST READING Isaiah 2: 1-5

The reader can be either a child or an adult; in either case, this person should know ahead of time in order to prepare carefully. This reading might be read with a sense of assurance and comfort.

PSALM RESPONSE

The psalm is not only a response to the first reading, but "responsorial" is the style in which the psalm is prayed, with the children responding to the cantor or reader. You might use the same psalm throughout the season of Advent. Suggestions:

GOSPEL Matthew 24:42-44

Usually the presider reads the Gospel. This Gospel might be read as giving practical advice and example for how we are to stay ready for the coming of Jesus, while avoiding making the "thief" reference sound too threatening.

HOMILY OUTLINE

See SUNDAY Weekly Leader Guide, Year A, pages 2 and 3, for "Focus of Readings" and "Reflecting on the Readings With Children." When reflecting on the scriptures with children, we always take our cues from the children's responses. In so doing, you might enrich their appreciation of God's word.

Liturgy Preparation

1st Sunday in Advent • Year A

☐ WE LISTEN TO GOD SPEAK

- ☐ What might the children in the assembly hear God saying to them in today's readings?
- ☐ How might you engage the children in the biblical experience with open-ended questions?

Concerning the first reading:

- Imagine what it would be like to live in the "house of God." How do you think people living in the house of God would treat each other?
- What so you think Isaiah means when he says "will decide what is right for the people"?
- How do you feel in your heart when you hear Isaiah talk about people living in peace?

Concerning the Gospel:

- What words or phrases do you recall?
- Why do you think Jesus spoke of the Lord's coming as a thief in the night? What might we lose if we are not awake when Jesus comes?
- What do you think Jesus meant when he said "Stay awake! Always be ready!"? Why do you think he told his disciples this?
- If you were one of the disciples listening to Jesus, how would you feel about not knowing when Jesus is coming again?

□ WE REFLECT ON THE REIGN OF GOD

- ☐ How can you invite the children to look out of the biblical experience at their lives today?
- ☐ How can you use the biblical imagery of today's readings to explore with children their experience of God's presence in our lives today?

Concerning the first reading:

- What is it like for you to follow God's ways?
- What is it like for you to have God decide what is right for you?
- How do you think God feels when people make tools out of weapons?

Concerning the Gospel:

- What does it mean for you to be ready?
- How does it feel when you have to wait for something? What is it like?
- What do you want to be doing when Jesus comes?
- How will you recognize Jesus when he does come?

□ WE RESPOND TO GOD'S WORD

- ☐ How might you attune yourself to encourage the children's own creative responses to God's word?
- ☐ How might the Spirit be moving the children to respond to God's word in praise and thanksgiving?

Examples for this week's readings:

- Think about your family: how can you make peace with each other?
- What are some things you can do to walk in the light of God?
- What can you do to follow God's ways in your family neighborhood, school?
- In what ways can you be ready for Jesus, when you do not know when he will return?

CREED

Invite children to profess our faith by creedal statements that echo the readings. Reflect on what the readings say about God as Creator, Jesus as Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit as Gift of Life. Express these statements so that the children can give their assent to them. This week's readings, for example, offer options like these:

- God: who alone decides what is right for us.
- Jesus: who comes to us in the most unexpected and wonderful ways.
- Holy Spirit: who gives us life and the wisdom to prepare for the coming of Jesus.

PRAYERS OF THE FAITHFUL

After the children have offered their prayers and concerns, you might also offer petitions based on the scripture texts. In formulating the prayers, you might draw from the verbs or "action words" in this week's readings. For example: may the time come soon..., prepare, stay awake, walk in the light of God...

Here are some guidelines for preparing petitions:

- \square Rather than telling God what to do, ask for guidance in doing God's will.
- □ Rather than expecting God to take action, ask God to support and strengthen us to do what God wants done.
- \square *Use inclusive language.*
- ☐ Let our prayers reflect the needs of our world, our church, and our communities (families, neighbors).

NOTE: Arrange to have SUNDAY Scripture Leaflets given to the children as they are leaving Mass. Encourage children and parents to use these leaflets through the week to continue reflecting prayerfully on God's word. In addition, emphasize the use of Light of the World, Our Family Spiritual Life Journal, pages 2 and 3, (Treehaus Communications, Inc.) as a way of assisting the family's deeper reflection on God's word at home.
